SECRETARY'S REPORT



KRTA June 9, 2022 Membership Meeting Minutes

The KRTA membership was greeted by Co-President Craig Weber. Craig led the membership in the Pledge of Allegiance. Tom Meade said Grace. Program Co-Chair, Jan Hissong, addressed the group with an assignment to be completed by the end of the meeting. Since the two Moler-Austin scholarship winners were present to accept their awards, Jan thought the retired teachers could share important teaching advice with these future teachers. The nuggets of wisdom would be collected and compiled into a booklet for each of the young women. Thoughtful idea Jan!

The Whitetail Ridge Restaurant staff served a wonderful sit-down lunch which followed Covid 19 restrictions.

Program: Tom Meade, Program Co-Chair, introduced the Illinois Early Childhood 2022 Teacher of the Year, Megan Hillegass. Megan has been teaching for 20 years at schools in Chicago, Blue Island, and Romeoville. She graduated from Erikson Institute in Chicago with a master's degree in early



childhood education and child development. Megan is an adjunct professor for Erikson Institute as well as an early childhood teacher. She shared a few classroom stories as examples of what she considers a key step in successful learning. She concentrates on what each child knows and can share about themselves, families, etc. At the beginning of the school year, Megan begins her classroom day with the young students telling her a story which Megan writes down verbatim. Eventually each child volunteers to “read” or tell their story to the rest of the classroom. Fellow students are expected to listen carefully so they can ask questions of the storyteller. Communication skills are introduced, practiced and applied to their curriculum during the day. Connections are made between the students and between the students and teacher. Doors to learning are opened. Megan concluded that attended interaction is something the students totally missed during Covid.



Tom Meade introduced Chris Mechoho, regional superintendent of Kendall County. Chris presented the Moler-Austin Scholarships to Anwen Hurd and Savanna Farren. The scholarship program was founded at the wishes of former Kendall County educator and KRTA member, Identia Austin. The estate committed two \$4500 scholarships each year to Kendall County education students in Illinois Universities. Anwen Hurd is an Oswego High School graduate and is a senior at Aurora University majoring in elementary ed with ESL endorsement. Savanna Farren is a graduate of Yorkville High School and is a senior at Aurora University majoring in elementary ed. She intends to get a master’s in reading.

Tom Meade presented the Educators Rising grants. Each of the five Kendall County High Schools support a Future Teachers Association in conjunction with an Aurora University program, Educators

Rising. KRTA contributes \$500 and the ROE Kendall County contributes \$1000 to the grant program. KRTA then awards a \$300 grant to each of these high school future teachers associations to help promote their program activities. Michelle McAnally accepted the \$300 grant for Newark High School.

Business Meeting

The April 14, 2022 membership luncheon-meeting minutes were approved as read.

Committee Reports

Community Participation: Alimae Persons thanked the KRTA membership for the \$105 collected today for the Food Pantry school supply donation.

COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION

LEGISLATIVE

BIG Election on November 8

So, is the most important race on Nov. 8--the one that involves incumbent Gov. JB Pritzker vs. challenger Darren Bailey; or is it incumbent US Representative Lauren Underwood vs. Scott Gryder ?

These are all big contests; but, as far as I am concerned, they are not #1

At my age (80), the most important thing in my life right now is protecting my pension. To me, the most important races on the ballot will be those to elect **new judges to the Illinois Supreme Court.**

Right now, there are two seats up for grabs in November with control of the Supreme Court hanging in the balance. Those seats are located in the newly redrawn **2nd District (including Kane, Kendall, Lake, McHenry, and DeKalb counties)** -- that's most of us -- and the 3rd District consisting of DuPage, Will, Kankakee, Iroquois, Grundy, LaSalle, and Bureau counties -- that's some of us.

Right now, Democrats on the bench outnumber Republicans 4-3 and yes you must declare a political affiliation to run for Supreme Court justice.

FYI, there are seven justices on the Illinois Supreme Court. Three are elected at large from the 1st District which comprises Cook County. The other four are elected (one each) from districts around the state. They are not lifetime justices. They serve 10-year terms.

The General Election candidates for the Illinois Supreme Court in the 2nd District are Elizabeth Rochford (D) vs. Mark Curran (R); and, for the 3rd District the candidates are Mary O'Brien (D) against incumbent Michael Burke (R). The Illinois Retired Teacher's Association (IRTA) has not yet made an endorsement of any candidates. You will be updated once this occurs.

Why are these races so important to us? The past Courts have repeatedly supported the state's constitutional pension protection clause to reject attempts to cut or eliminate teacher pension benefits. The teachers lost two important supporters of the protection clause in Justice Rita (Bell) Garman, who recently retired, and Justice Tom Kilbride who was defeated in a retention election in 2020. One IL Justice, Mary Jane Theis, is up for a retention vote this November.

With the **U.S. Supreme Court** increasingly overturning federal laws or previous decisions on major issues like voting rights, abortion, gun laws, etc., it seems likely that **Illinois' top court** will have an increased role in these areas.

This may sound a little complicated, but you will be receiving more information from me and/or Janet Reardon as the election grows closer.
